GGSA 'Fish Like A Girl' Trip Produces Salmon Limits

n Friday, July 5, the second Golden Gate Salmon Association

(GGSA) "Fish Like a Girl" all ladies salmon fishing trip aboard the Salty Lady departed from the Sausalito Harbor to fish outside of the Golden Gate.

"We traveled out to the W Buoy, a long run from the harbor," said Cat Kaiser, the GGSA Fundraising and Events Coordinator. "The weather was choppy, very typical of salmon fishing conditions. It was cloudy and foggy in the morning and then calmed down in the afternoon. Even though was It was a far run, only a couple of the girls got sick and they were not down for

By the end of the day, the 21 ladies and the three crew members aboard the boat had caught limits of quality Chinook salmon, a total of 48 fish.

"To say these ladies had fun catching full limits of big salmon on the trip would be an understatement," said Kaiser. "For some, it was about catching their first

salmon. For others, it was about doing what they love with 21

fellow fisherwomen. For all, it was a day of supporting, cheering, laughing and catching.'

The fish averaged a solid 12 pounds each and lot of Chinooks in the 18-pound class were landed. Kaiser won the jackpot with a 25-pound king.

They landed the fish while trolling anchovies anywhere from 30 to 80 feet pulls deep.

"All of the girls

become best friends at the end of day," said Kaiser. "The support and camaraderie among the women was unbelievable. They were hooting, hollering, laughing and cheering for each other for every fish that came over the rail. There were lots of hugs on this trip."

Salty Lady Captain Jared Davis ran the

What We're Using



Cal Kellogg - hosted a Cal Kellogg School of Fishing adventure aboard the Pacific Dream for S.F. Bay halibut and stripers. For light

tackle live bait drifting, Cal used a Cousins baitcaster rated for 8 to 17 pound line paired with an Abu Garcia Orra Inshore baitcaster with a 7.1:1 gear ratio. The reel was spooled with 30 lb Yo-Zuri braid. The trip produced 40 halibut to 32 lbs and a handful of stripers.




Paul Kneeland - fished the last days of the season at Pyramid Lake with John Brassfield of Trucksmart stores in the Fish Sniffer 21' Rogue Jet Coastal. They

caught Lahontan cutthroat trout to 12 pounds 8 oz., using a Okuma 9' light action Kokanee Black Rod with a Daiwa Lexa 100 line counter reel loaded with 8 lb test Yozuri Topknot Flourocarbon line.. They trolled "Dill Pickle" Lyman lures and watermelon 5 1/2 inch Apex spoons on the surface and off the Canon Downriggers at 20 to 45 feet deep and 2.5 mph.



Dan Bacher - fished for rainbow trout at Lake Alpine in Alpine County. He used a Berkley Ugly Stick GX2 6' 6" medium action spinning rod, teamed up with a

Shakespeare GX235 spinning reel filled with 6 lb. test P-Line CX Premium Fluorocarbon Coated Line. He fished with rainbow Berkley PowerBait, 1/8 oz. gold and black Panther Martins and 2/5 oz. gold/red stripe Little Cleos. Dan coated his baits and lures with Bloody Tuna scent Pro-Cure Super Gel.



Fish Sniffer TIP OF THE WEEK

Some anglers use line as light as 4 pound test while others use line as heavy as 12 pound test when trolling for trout and kokanee. Line size is no longer an issue when it comes to spooking fish with the wide availability of fluorocarbon line that is basically invisible to fish. For general use, 8 or 10 pound test line is a good compromise between strength and fine diameter.

morning, and persistent periods of wind throughout the day. We had a tough time keeping the boat straight and the lines in the water. My wife Gina and kids kept busy putting corn on the hooks as I tried to keep the boat straight.

The good news was that the fishing was off the hook. I estimated that we landed in the neighborhood of 40-60 kokanee, and lost many as well. The bad news was that most of the fish were in the 8 to 13 inch range, much too small to factor into the derby.

We were able to shake most of the small fish off at the back of the boat. I also developed a technique where I unhooked fish and put them into my bucket. Once revived, I lowered the bucket over the side and let the lake water mix into the bucket until the fish swam away. Anything that didn't revive was kept for dinners of cornmeal crusted kokanee.

Although it wasn't great for our weight totals, the smaller fish kept the kids busy landing and netting fish all day. It was a fun family day of fishing, but our weight totals after day one were pathetic compared to the leading teams. We were over two pounds be

leading teams. We were over two pounds behind the leading team, and I knew we would have to change it up for day two.

The second morning was much nicer in terms of weather. We still had a northwest breeze, but it wasn't to the point where it affected our ability to fish. While we had fished in the main lake on day one, I decided to fish the Whiskey Creek arm of the lake on day two. The decision paid off immediately, as my side planer got slammed just a few minutes after the start of fishing

time at 5:30 am.

My rod doubled over and the orange side planer violently surged into the water. "Nice fish", I relayed to Gina, as the kokanee started peeling line off my reel. As Gina was unclipping the side planer, I heard my son Adam yelling "Daddy! Fish!" Adam's downrigger rod was bouncing, but I wanted to focus on getting my fish into the net first. His fish crossed under my fish to the opposite side of the boat, and Gina netted my fish a few moments later. I quickly flipped the large kokanee into the bucket and assed the situation regarding Adam's fish.

The second kokanee had swam around the back of the boat and wrapped the line across the two port side downrigger cables. In a twist of luck, the fish reversed course and moved into position behind the boat. It made a few runs and then thrashed on the surface. I immediately freaked out, thinking that the hook would come flying out at any second. Fortunately, I was able to slip the net under the fish a few moments later, and Adam had a hog in the box.

Adam's kokanee was the second heaviest fish weighed in for the derby, coming in at 2.28 pounds! After catching dozens of small fish on the first day, we mysteriously managed to catch only big fish on the second day. We headed to the weight station at one o'clock with 14 kokanee in the box, most of which were over 15 inches in length.

Although we didn't crack the top five places, we were able to come back far enough on Sunday to earn a check. Both kids got trophies and prizes for their fish, and overall it was a nice chance spend the weekend fishing and socializing with the other participants. It was great to see several different year classes of kokanee thriving once again at Whiskeytown Lake.

The Red Lion hotel in Redding is only about 25 minutes from the lake, and it provides great accommodations to the derby participants. The pool, restaurant, and bar all provide great places to relax and socialize with other contestants in the derby.

For those of you who haven't tried it, I suggest making a mini-vacation out of one of the Kokanee Power events. They have more derbies lined up this summer, and I recommend attending any of their future events if you can. Information is listed on their website at www.kokaneepower.org
